FEEDBACK ANALYSIS OF STAKEHOLDERS AND ACTION TAKEN REPORT (2019-20) Feedback Collection Process from the Stakeholders The institution collected online feedback on the curriculum from different stakeholders such as students, alumni, faculty, employers and parents with the questionnaire prepared by IQAC. Feedback is collected from the outgoing students on the completion of their course, parents during parent-teacher meetings, from alumni on annual fraternity meet held on 2nd October every year and from the teachers and employers at the end of the academic year. The parameters used to get the feedback are course content, curriculum relevance to the solution for local problems, prospects for higher education and Employability opportunities etc. Feedback Analysis The data collected from all the stakeholders is sorted out by the IQAC and consolidated for preparing the feedback analysis report. The data entered in the selected format is then converted into chart form and a comprehensive report is prepared with special emphasis on the aspects pointed out by all the stakeholders. The analysis is done stakeholder wise and parameter wise. The IQAC committee has discussed and consolidated the suggestions. Action Taken Report The suggestions received through the feedback are promptly communicated to heads of all the Departments. The suggestions made by the stakeholders were discussed thoroughly in BoS meetings. Considering the suggestions, the BoS committee members gave the inputs for syllabus revision and also proposed certain recommendations to be implemented. Research activities must be strengthened by participating in seminars/conferences: Students presented papers in seminars/conferences to promote research culture 3 Parents: Social awareness to be imparted to students: Students were encouraged to participate in Swatch Bharat and NSS day and Red ribbon club activities for Social awareness. 4 Alumni: Practical knowledge to be imparted to face real-life situations Student study Projects and individual presentations by students were incorporated in the curriculum. The college has well defined policy for maintenance and utilization of all its physical and academic facilities. • The college has four computer labs with LAN connections and these computers are maintained by the college funds with the help of trained personnel. Budget is provided by the Govt. for the purchase of new computers and for the repair of old computers. The college has repairs and maintenance committee with Principal as the chairperson. Every year in the beginning of academic year, the in-charges of all the departments take periodical review of repairs and requirements of their respective departments and submit the same to the committee. The committee takes final call on purchases and repairs based on the availability of funds. • The college has well established library as per the requirement, need and indent of books, Journals taken from the in- charges of various departments. The finalized list of required books is duly approved and signed by the Principal. Every year in the beginning of Semester, students are motivated to register themselves in library to use INFLIBNET. • College has Volley Ball court, TT Courts and Gymnasium that are maintained by the policies defined by student council every year.Students are encouraged to participate in extra and co-curricular activities and sport activities at University/ State/ National level competitions. • The college has two virtual classrooms for remote connectivity with other colleges in the state. The maintenance is provided by the O/o CCE, Vijayawada. • The audio visual equipment in the auditorium is donated by the alumni and maintenance is done through the outsourcing electrician. • The classrooms, corridors, toilets and laboratories are cleaned by the outsourcing staff and monitored regularly by the office superintendent. • The do's and don'ts are displayed on the notice boards of all the laboratories to maintain cleanliness in laboratories. • The hostels and college premises are kept under CCTV surveillance and monitored through mobile streaming. The faculty members are allotted as block in-charges to maintain cleanliness in the hostels. • The college premises are kept clean regularly by the outsourcing staff and periodically through clean and green programs conducted by the NSS/ NCC students.

Institute has Both External and Internal Audit Process. Internal Includes by the Finance Committee Office and CA. The External Committee Includes Regional Joint Director and finally by AG Audit. Finance committee is constituted with principal as the chairman of the committee, chartered accountants, vice

principal, senior faculty member and office superintendent as the members of the committee. The committee is approved by the governing body. The principal organizes the finance committee meetings at regular intervals and inspects the accounts. The finance committee manages the funds received from various schemes and projects. Utilization certificate is sent to the funding agencies along with the audited statements of accounts by the finance committee once the scheme is closed. The accounts are regularly audited by the chartered accountant and whenever there are audit objections, systematic follow-up actions are taken up. So far there is no remarkable audit objection. Similarly AG audit is also done for the funds released by UGC and other government agencies and for the current year AG audit was completed in the month of December 2018. At the end of every academic year principal nominates stock verification team which visits every department and inspects the records maintained by them and submits the same to the Principal. The college is making payments only through cheques and receives donation, endowment funds and other funds only through cheques, DD or online transfer for maintaining account transparency.
